As my students learned of much correspondence between the Is -lamic view of nature and the Japanese religious sentiment, they began to have an interest in Islam!

Yes, Islam is not heterogeneous for us Japanese at all. In o-ther words, Islamic universality itself never consider our religious sentiment to be heterogeneous. As long as Islam is universal, it must hold true in our religious heart. Verily it is so universal that we Japanese, and you Brothers, all human beings were born as Muslims; only being unaware of it on our part.

Dear Brothers in Islam in North America! In a Far Eastern country remote from Makka al-Mukarrama, in a small city, at a sm

-all college, at a little classroom, my students and I keep stud-ying Islam, with untiring zeal, with ever increasing interest a -nd with the aim of crossing that bridge someday!
